“Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties”

The Centre for NaMo Studies (CNMS), in collaboration with the Dr Ambedkar International Centre (DAIC), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India, organised a National Seminar on “Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties” at Nalanda Hall, DAIC, New Delhi, under the “NaMo Viksit Bharat Samvad” series as India marks 80 years of Independence.

The programme featured two thematic sessions: “Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties” and “Har Ghar Tiranga: Inspiring Gen-Z to Uphold the Spirit of 80 Years of Independence.” The first session focused on constitutional values, Fundamental Duties and responsible citizenship, while the second explored the significance of the Tiranga as a symbol of national pride, unity and collective identity, along with the role of Generation Z in carrying forward the spirit and legacy of India’s Independence.



Ms. Anca Verma, Managing Trustee, Shrikant Verma Trust & Veena Verma Foundation, who attended as the Principal Guest, highlighted the relationship between India's constitutional framework and its civilisational heritage. She discussed the idea of Dharma in terms of duty, responsibility, righteous conduct and social order, and drew attention to the philosophical continuity between rights accompanied by responsibilities and India's civilisational thought.

She also emphasised the importance of patriotism through responsible conduct, including the honest performance of duties, respect for those who serve and defend the nation, preservation of cultural heritage and nurturing pride in India among children.

A significant part of her address focused on the younger generation. She highlighted India's young and ambitious population and stressed that the achievements and aspirations of young Indians should be accompanied



by a sense of responsibility and contribution towards the nation. She also underlined the collective role of families, teachers, soldiers, farmers, workers, entrepreneurs, scientists and responsible citizens in building a strong nation.

Speaking about her own connection with India, Verma said that although she was not born in the country, she had lived in India for 20 years and had come to regard it as her home. She said her family and life were now rooted in India and that she had spent more years of her life in India than in her home country, Romania.

“While I may not be Indian by birth, I truly [am] Indian at heart,” she said, reflecting on her long association with the country.

Mrs Verma stressed that discussions on Fundamental Rights must be accompanied by an equally strong understanding of Fundamental Duties.



While acknowledging the importance of rights, she said a strong nation cannot be built on rights alone.

She urged citizens to examine their own conduct and ask whether they respect the law, honour national symbols, protect public property, preserve the environment and promote harmony.

She also emphasised the responsibility of educating the next generation to place duty, discipline and the nation before personal convenience, describing these responsibilities as the foundations of responsible citizenship.

Highlighting India's civilisational heritage, Verma said India is more than a modern political nation and described it as one of the world's oldest living civilisations, with a cultural and philosophical tradition stretching back thousands of years.

She identified Dharma as one of the important ideas running through Indian thought, while clarifying that it should not be understood merely in terms of faith or ritual. At a deeper level, she said, Dharma concerns duty, responsibility, righteous conduct and maintaining order in society.

Referring to Chanakya, Verma said ancient Indian political thought had recognised that a strong state required more than power. It required discipline, good governance, responsibility and a ruler who remained conscious of his duty towards the people.

She, however, distinguished India's modern constitutional system from its ancient traditions, stressing that modern India is governed by its Constitution and not by ancient texts. At the same time, she pointed to a philosophical continuity between the two in the principle that authority must be accompanied by duty, rights by responsibility and power by accountability.

Verma said Fundamental Duties, in many ways, reflect this enduring Indian idea of Dharma. She explained that while the Constitution establishes what the Republic owes to its citizens, Dharma encourages citizens to ask what they owe to the Republic, society and future generations.

“The Constitution tells us what the Republic owes to its citizens. Dharma reminds us to also ask what we owe to the Republic, to society, and to future generations,” she said, describing this balance as essential.

She further said a confident India can protect democracy and respect diversity while simultaneously remaining deeply proud of its history, traditions and national identity.

Verma also elaborated on the meaning of patriotism, saying it should not be limited to waving the national flag.

According to her, patriotism is demonstrated through the honest performance of one’s duties, respect for those who serve and defend the nation, preservation of Indian culture and efforts to teach children to be proud of India.

She also stressed that national interest should be placed above narrow personal or sectional interests, making responsible conduct and commitment to the larger national interest central to the meaning of patriotism.

A major part of Verma’s address focused on young Indians. She said the message of duty and responsibility is particularly important for the younger generation because India is young, ambitious and increasingly confident on the global stage.

She noted that young Indians are succeeding across the world, but stressed that success must be accompanied by responsibility.

She urged young people to move beyond a purely individual understanding of achievement and to think about their contribution to the country.

“Young Indians should not only ask, ‘What can I achieve?’ They should also ask, ‘What can I contribute to India?’” she said.

Verma said great nations are not built only by governments or political leaders. They are also built through the contribution of disciplined families, dedicated teachers, brave soldiers, hardworking farmers, workers, entrepreneurs, scientists and responsible citizens.

Reflecting on 80 years of India’s Independence, Verma said the present generation must remember the generation that fought to make India free.

She said the responsibility of the current generation is to build an India that is stronger, more self-reliant, more united and more confident in its civilisational identity.

Connecting constitutional values with individual conduct, she said the Constitution provides the framework, Dharma provides the consciousness of duty, and citizens’ conduct must give meaning to both.

“The Constitution gives us the framework. Dharma gives us the consciousness of duty. And our conduct must give both meaning,” she said.

In her concluding message, Verma called upon citizens to respect the Constitution and fulfil their Fundamental Duties. She also urged them to preserve India's civilisational heritage and protect national unity.

She called for building an India that is modern in its ambitions, confident in its identity and firmly rooted in its traditions.

Summing up the central message of her address, she placed before the audience five principles: "Nation before self. Duty with rights. Dharma with democracy. Development with heritage. Unity with national pride."

She concluded her address by thanking the gathering and saying "Jai Hind."

Dr. Vinod K. Verma, President, Group Corporate Affairs, Aditya Birla Group, attended the National Seminar as the Guest of Honour and underlined the importance of making constitutional values an integral part of everyday public life. He emphasised that the Constitution should not be viewed merely as a formal legal framework but as a set of values that must be understood, respected and reflected in the conduct of citizens.

He stressed that the strength of constitutional democracy depends significantly on how deeply its values are understood and practised by people in their daily lives. Respect for the constitutional framework, he noted, must translate into responsible behaviour, social responsibility and a conscious commitment towards the larger interests of society and the nation.

Verma also highlighted the importance of active citizen participation in India's journey towards Viksit Bharat, observing that national development cannot be achieved through governmental efforts alone. Citizens, institutions and communities have an equally important role to play in contributing to the country's progress and ensuring that development remains inclusive and people-oriented.

Particular emphasis was placed on the younger generation, whose aspirations, energy and participation would be crucial in shaping India's future. He stressed the need for young Indians to view nation-building not merely as a responsibility of governments and institutions but as a collective endeavour requiring active and meaningful participation from citizens.

He further observed that the idea of a developed India should not be confined to economic indicators or material advancement. Development, he emphasised, must also be rooted in dignity, discipline and inclusiveness, while remaining firmly anchored in respect for the constitutional framework.

According to Verma, India's progress towards Viksit Bharat therefore requires a balanced approach in which economic aspirations are accompanied by social responsibility, constitutional consciousness and respect for the dignity of every citizen. He emphasised that the values underpinning the Constitution must guide the country's development journey and shape the conduct of citizens as India moves towards its larger national goals.

Col. Shri Akash Patil, Director, Dr Ambedkar International Centre, shared an expert perspective on the “Har Ghar Tiranga” initiative during the thematic session on “Har Ghar Tiranga: Inspiring Gen-Z to Uphold the Spirit of 80 Years of Independence.” He highlighted the significance of the Tiranga as an important symbol of India’s national identity and collective consciousness.

He emphasised that the national flag represents the unity of the country, bringing together citizens across diverse regions, communities and backgrounds under a shared national identity. The Tiranga, he noted, carries a larger message of togetherness and reminds citizens of the common values that bind the nation.

Col Patil also highlighted the association of the Tiranga with national pride and the sacrifices made in the journey of India’s Independence. He underlined the importance of remembering the contribution and sacrifices of those who worked and fought for the country, particularly as India commemorates 80 years of Independence.

He stressed that the significance of the national flag extends beyond its ceremonial display and should inspire citizens to develop a deeper sense of belonging and responsibility towards the nation. In this context, the “Har Ghar Tiranga” initiative provides an opportunity to strengthen citizens’ emotional connection with the national flag and the values it represents.

A key focus of his perspective was the younger generation and Generation Z. Patil highlighted the need to connect young Indians with the values of national unity, pride, sacrifice and collective identity represented by the Tiranga, so that the spirit of Independence continues to remain meaningful for future generations.

He further emphasised the importance of carrying these values forward through responsible citizenship and active participation in national life. The discussion around “Har Ghar Tiranga” thus placed the national flag not only as a symbol of India’s past and present but also as an inspiration for the younger generation to contribute to the country’s future.

Dr. Dinesh Dubey, Editor-in-Chief, The Emerging World Daily, shared his perspective during the National Seminar on “Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties”, organised by the Centre for NaMo Studies (CNMS) in collaboration with the Dr Ambedkar International Centre (DAIC), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India, under the “NaMo Viksit Bharat Samvad” series.

In his remarks, Dr. Dubey highlighted the importance of constitutional values in shaping an informed and responsible citizenry. He emphasised the need for citizens to understand the principles that underpin the Constitution and to recognise their role in strengthening democratic institutions and public life.

He also drew attention to the importance of Fundamental Duties alongside Fundamental Rights, stressing that democracy functions effectively when citizens are conscious not only of the rights available to them but also of the responsibilities they carry towards society and the nation.

Dr. Dubey underlined the significance of constitutional awareness among young people, particularly at a time when India is commemorating 80 years of Independence. He emphasised the need to

encourage the younger generation to engage with the country's constitutional framework and understand the responsibilities associated with citizenship.

He also connected the seminar's discussions with the broader themes of national unity, responsible citizenship and the role of the media and public discourse in creating greater awareness about issues of national importance. He stressed the value of informed discussion in strengthening democratic consciousness.

His remarks added a media and public-discourse perspective to the seminar's deliberations, complementing the contributions of speakers and experts on constitutional values, Fundamental Duties, national identity and the responsibilities of citizens in India's journey towards a stronger and more developed nation.

The National Seminar also witnessed the release of *Beyond the Brief: Jurisprudential Shifts in the Apex Court*, authored by Dr. Anu Bhuvanachandran, Advocate on Record, Supreme Court of India, with a Foreword by Justice Shri B. R. Gavai, former Chief Justice of India. The book has been published by the Centre for NaMo Studies (CNMS) and formed an important part of the programme's academic and legal discourse.

Speaking on the occasion, Dr. Anu Bhuvanachandran described the book as an attempt to examine the evolving jurisprudence of the Supreme Court and the broader legal principles that have shaped the interpretation of constitutional provisions. She said the work seeks to look beyond individual judgments and understand the larger shifts taking place in constitutional and judicial thinking.

She said the title *Beyond the Brief* reflects the effort to move beyond the immediate facts and legal arguments presented before the Court and examine the wider constitutional questions emerging from landmark judicial decisions. “A judgment does not exist in isolation; it becomes part of a continuing constitutional conversation that shapes how law, rights and institutions are understood,” she said.

Bhuvanachandran said the book brings together observations on the changing dimensions of jurisprudence and the manner in which the Apex Court has responded to emerging questions of law and society. She emphasised that judicial decisions often have implications extending well beyond the litigants before the Court, influencing public institutions, governance and the rights and responsibilities of citizens.

She also highlighted the importance of constitutional interpretation in a changing society, noting that courts are frequently required to engage with questions arising from new social realities while remaining anchored in constitutional principles. “The challenge is to preserve the enduring values of the Constitution while responding thoughtfully to the changing needs of society,” she said.

Referring to the role of legal scholarship, she said works examining judicial developments can help students, researchers, lawyers and members of the wider public better understand the reasoning behind important constitutional decisions. She expressed hope that the book would contribute to informed discussion on the evolution of Indian jurisprudence and encourage deeper engagement with the work of the Supreme Court.

The release of the book added an important academic dimension to the seminar, which brought together discussions on constitutional values,

Fundamental Duties, responsible citizenship, national identity and the role of the younger generation. The publication also reflected the Centre for NaMo Studies' emphasis on promoting research, scholarship and informed public discourse on issues concerning the Constitution, law and national development.

Mr. Feroz Khan Ghazi, Secretary General, South Asian Minorities Lawyers Association, in his address, highlighted the importance of constitutional values in strengthening democracy and ensuring that every citizen remains conscious of the rights and responsibilities guaranteed under the constitutional framework.

He emphasised that the Constitution provides a common framework for citizens belonging to different communities, regions and social backgrounds, and said that constitutional values such as equality, justice, dignity and fraternity are essential for maintaining social cohesion in a diverse country like India.

Ghazi stressed that Fundamental Duties should receive as much attention as Fundamental Rights in public discourse. He underlined the need for citizens to understand that the enjoyment of rights carries with it a corresponding responsibility towards society, institutions and the nation.

He also highlighted the importance of legal and constitutional awareness among young people, observing that the younger generation will play a decisive role in determining the future direction of Indian democracy. He emphasised the need to familiarise young citizens with the Constitution so that they can participate more meaningfully in public life.

Speaking in the context of India's 80 years of Independence, Ghazi reflected on the importance of preserving the democratic and constitutional values that have guided the country since Independence. He stressed that the legacy of the freedom struggle must be carried forward through responsible citizenship, respect for institutions and commitment to national unity.

He further underlined the importance of inclusiveness and social harmony, saying that India's strength lies in its diversity and that constitutional principles provide the foundation for ensuring that every citizen feels equally connected to the nation. He called for greater awareness of civic responsibilities and a culture of mutual respect among citizens.

Ghazi's remarks added a legal and constitutional perspective to the seminar's deliberations, complementing the discussions on Fundamental Duties, national identity, responsible citizenship and the role of Gen-Z. His address contributed to the broader objective of encouraging informed public engagement with the Constitution and strengthening awareness of the responsibilities accompanying citizenship.

Prof. Jasim Mohammad, Chairman, Centre for NaMo Studies (CNMS) and Convenor, NaMo Viksit Bharat Samvad, delivered the introductory remarks at the National Seminar on "Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties", setting the context for the deliberations on constitutional consciousness, responsible citizenship and the role of young Indians in strengthening democracy.

In his introductory address, Prof. Jasim Mohammad highlighted the significance of organising a dedicated national-level discussion on constitutional values and Fundamental Duties at a time when India is marking 80 years of Independence. He underlined the need to reflect not only on the country's achievements since Independence but also on the responsibilities that accompany citizenship in a democratic republic.

He emphasised the importance of creating greater awareness about the Constitution among citizens, particularly young people. A central aspect of his remarks was the need to maintain a proper balance between Fundamental Rights and Fundamental Duties. He highlighted that while the Constitution guarantees important rights to citizens, the effective functioning of a democracy also depends upon citizens recognising and fulfilling their responsibilities towards society and the nation.

Prof. Jasim also emphasised the importance of engaging the younger generation in discussions concerning constitutional values. He noted that young citizens constitute an important part of India's present and future and therefore need to understand not only the rights available to them but also the duties and responsibilities expected from them as citizens.

He linked this responsibility with the broader vision of Viksit Bharat, observing that the journey towards a developed India requires citizens who are informed, responsible and committed to the larger national interest. In this context, he highlighted the role of constitutional values

in nurturing a culture of responsible participation and strengthening the foundations of democratic governance.

The seminar, he noted, was also significant in bringing together diverse voices from the legal, academic, social and professional spheres. The participation of distinguished guests, speakers and experts provided an opportunity for meaningful discussion on constitutional values, Fundamental Duties, national identity, responsible citizenship and the role of the younger generation.

Prof. Jasim Mohammad expressed his gratitude to the Chief Guest, Ms. Anca Verma, Managing Trustee, Shrikant Verma Trust, for her presence and contribution to the seminar. He also acknowledged the participation of the Guest of Honour, Dr. Vinod K. Har Ghar Tiranga Campaign Seeks to Connect Gen-Z With Responsible Citizenship at CNMS Discussion

NEW DELHI: The Centre for NaMo Studies (CNMS), in collaboration with the Dr Ambedkar International Centre organised a discussion on "Har Ghar Tiranga", focusing on engaging Generation Z with the values of unity, civic responsibility, social harmony and constructive participation in public life at DAIC New Delhi.

The speakers emphasised that the national flag represents shared values and collective responsibility, and said young citizens can express these values through their everyday conduct, social service, respect for diversity, environmental responsibility and adherence to law.

Delivering the keynote address, Col. Akash Patil,



Director, Dr Ambedkar International Centre, said young people have an important role in shaping society and should use their skills and technology responsibly.

"Young people are not simply the future of the country; they are important participants in shaping its present. Responsibility begins when

we understand that our individual actions have an impact on society," Col Patil said.

Dr Dinesh Dubey, Editor-in-Chief, The Emerging World Daily, highlighted the responsibility of young people in the digital information environment. "In the digital age, every individual has become a potential publisher. With

that opportunity comes the responsibility to verify information before sharing it," Dr Dubey said.

Dr Md Shams Eqbal, Director, National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language (NCPUL), Ministry of Education, underlined the importance of education in developing responsible citizens.

"Education does not only provide employment; it develops understanding, confidence and a sense of responsibility. An educated young generation can become the strongest foundation for a progressive society," Eqbal said. He also stressed the importance of India's linguistic and cultural diversity.

In his introductory

remarks, Prof. Jasim Mohammad, Chairman, Centre for NaMo Studies, said Har Ghar Tiranga can provide an opportunity to connect young citizens with wider values of unity, service and responsibility.

"The national flag is not simply something that we display; it represents our shared values, unity and collective aspirations. Its message becomes meaningful when we carry those values into our daily lives," Prof. Jasim said. He also highlighted the potential of Gen-Z to contribute to the country's development.

The session was moderated by Jawaid Rahmani, who focused on critical thinking and responsible digital participation among young people.

Tiranga: Inspiring Gen-Z

New Delhi Aug 17, 2026: The Centre for NaMo Studies (CNMS), in collaboration with the Dr Ambedkar International Centre organised a discussion on "Har Ghar Tiranga", focusing on engaging Generation Z with the values of unity, civic responsibility, social harmony and constructive participation in public life at DAIC New Delhi.

The speakers emphasised that the national flag represents shared values and collective responsibility, and said young citizens can express these values through their everyday conduct, social service, respect for diversity, environmental responsibility and adherence to law.

Delivering the keynote address, Col. Akash Patil, Director, Dr Ambedkar International Centre, said young people have an important role in shaping society and should use their skills and technology responsibly.

"Young people are not simply the future of the country; they are important participants in shaping its present. Responsibility begins when we understand that our individual actions have an impact on society," Col Patil said.

Dr Dinesh Dubey, Editor-



in-Chief, The Emerging World Daily, highlighted the responsibility of young people in the digital information environment. "In the digital age, every individual has become a potential publisher. With that opportunity comes the responsibility to verify information before sharing it," Dr Dubey said.

Dr Md Shams Equbal, Director, National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language (NCPUL), Ministry of Education, underlined the importance of education in developing responsible citizens.

"Education does not only provide employment; it develops understanding, confidence and a sense of responsibility. An educated young generation can become the strongest foundation for a progressive society," Equbal said. He also stressed the importance of India's linguistic and cultural diversity.

In his introductory remarks, Prof. Jasim Mohammad, Chairman, Centre for NaMo Studies, said Har Ghar Tiranga can provide an opportunity to connect young citizens with wider values of unity, service and respon-

sibility.

"The national flag is not simply something that we display; it represents our shared values, unity and collective aspirations.

Its message becomes meaningful when we carry those values into our daily lives," Prof. Jasim said.

He also highlighted the potential of Gen-Z to contribute to the country's development.

The session was moderated by Jawaid Rahmani, who focused on critical thinking and responsible digital participation among young people.

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
